Rebecca got a gold for form, bronze for sparring and sliver after a tie break situation for boards.


Spencer got joint 3rd place bronze in forms.

The results were in and once again, amongst 26 different


Primary schools, Owlsmoor finished in an incredible 9<sup>th</sup> place!


#### Reception:

To infinity and beyond....

Welcome back after the half term holiday. We hope you all had a good break (despite the lack of sunshine!). You might have noticed our new Science Garden taking shape and we have already planted some summer flowering bulbs that the children are eagerly waiting to appear. We are still looking for bedding plants to put in this space so if you are doing any planting, do drop off any spares to your class teachers.

Our topic this half term is 'To infinity and beyond...' and the children are super excited as we kick off this unit of work with a trip to Winchester Science Centre. In our build-up work to the trip we have been finding out all about the first men on the moon. The children have been enjoying our 'space topic areas' and getting stuck in to writing biographical facts about Neil Armstrong.







Next week we will begin our work on making moon buggies and writing instructions to build them. We would like the children to bring in a cereal box as a base for their moon buggies. We are also looking for other junk modelling materials to develop these buggies so do send in cardboard tubes, bottle tops, small boxes and containers to add satellites, seats and other features to the buggies – silver foil pie dishes make great satellite dishes!

Our science this half term will be based on the materials we use to build and design vehicles – buggies, planes and rockets! We will also be fulfilling our curriculum promise to design and make a kite. You may have noticed our developing outdoor construction area – if you have any spare 'splinter free' decking boards, planks, strong crates or wheels that the children can use to build larger scale models please do speak to your child's teacher.

As the weather is starting to warm up, please send your child in with a hat, water and suncream when appropriate.

#### Year 3

#### Year 4

Before the half term, the children enjoyed their topic of Anglo-Saxons, re-writing their own versions of Beowulf and writing a non-chronological report on a dragon. For their reports, they wrote them across a double-page and had to carefully consider their presentation. They looked fantastic! The children also created repeating pattern prints using polystyrene tiles and then an Anglo-Saxon inspired animal design. Also, we enjoyed an extra-special school trip to the Winchester Science Museum – we had such a good

time and the children were such role-models for the school. Their behaviour was excellent and apart from a few awake in the early hours of the morning, most children (and staff) slept surprisingly well!



#### Year 5

Welcome back! We hope you had a wonderful break. It's hard to believe we're already in the final term of the year! Before the half-term break, we had a very busy period, especially with our art project inspired by the work of Giacometti. For this project, we created wire sculptures based on the Tudor rose. These sculptures allowed us to explore both historical symbolism and artistic techniques. By manipulating the wire, we learned how to craft the intricate beauty of the Tudor rose. We then used Modroc to form the petals and finished them off by carefully painting them. Our classroom was filled with creativity and excitement as we brought these delicate designs to life.











Our visitors, the caterpillars, transformed into beautiful butterflies. To mark the end of Science week we all released them in the playground and watched them flutter away. It certainly was a memorising moment.







Visiting Marwell Zoo was an incredible experience for all of us. With perfect weather, we thoroughly enjoyed seeing a range of animals, from sloths and ostriches to monkeys, who kept us all entertained.

Even the tiger made an appearance to say hello! The children were very well-behaved throughout the visit, making the day even more enjoyable.











# Nursey

We hope you had a lovely half term and that you are all relaxed and ready for the summer term. This half term we have some exciting things to look forward to, like sports day and the farm visit. More details will follow shortly with regards to both.

#### **Places to Visit**

Last half term, we continued with our topic 'Places to Visit'. We learnt about cafés, woodlands, garden centres and the seaside. We looked at garden centres and talked about lots of different things that you could buy there and the different tools you need to keep your garden neat and tidy. We also looked at lots of pretty different flowers, and how some plants grow from seeds and others from bulbs. When we learnt about cafés, we enjoyed role playing, where we took on the different roles of the employees, like a chef, waitress, customer and barista.





During woodlands, we learnt about the different types of animals we would find in the woods, from deer and owls to all the minibeasts. We then used our learning in our own environment, where we noticed the red kites flying over and around the school and finding different minibeasts in our outside area. We talked about how we care for our woodlands and that we need to look after them.





#### **Butterflies**

We have been fascinated with the caterpillars in our classroom and learning all about the lifecycle of a butterfly. We have observed them grow and grow and grow, until they were really big and turned into chrysalides. We then watched and waited everyday for the butterflies to emerge. It was amazing watching them emerge from their chrysalis and expand their wings. Once they had all emerged and their wings had dried, we took them up onto the field to let them go, so that the lifecycle could start all over again.







#### Maths

During maths, we have been learning about different shapes. We looked at what 3D shapes would best be used to build a bridge, we were then given a challenge to build a bridge so that a car could drive under it safely. We found out that cubes and cuboids made the best bridges and that a cylinder would only work if it was placed on its circular face.







Hopefully with the better weather upon us, can we please remind you to apply sun cream to your child before they come to school, most sun creams offer at least 8 hour protection. Also, all children will need a named sun hat for outside learning and water bottle. We have noticed an increase in juice within children's water bottles, children may have juice in their lunch boxes for lunch time however plain water only in the class water bottle please.
