The two articles they were discussing are:



Article 29 (goals of education)

Education must develop every child's personality, talents and abilities to the full. It must encourage the child's respect for human rights, as well as respect for their parents, their own and other cultures and the environment.

Article 24 – Health Care – (ensures that every child has the right to the best possible health)

Governments must provide good quality **health care, clean water, nutritious food, and a clean environment and education on health** and well-being so that children can stay healthy.

Richer countries must help poorer countries achieve this.

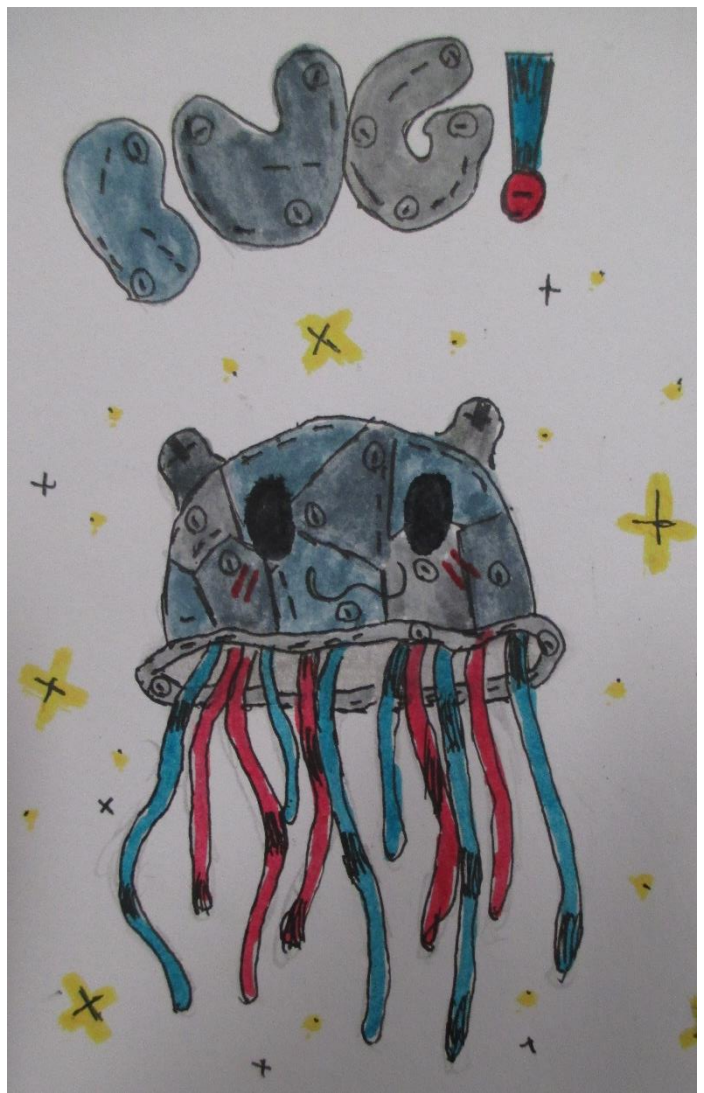

Nursery

Wow, this term is flying by! Our new Puffins have settled in well and, with the help of the older Puffins, have picked up the routines really quickly. This half term, our topic is 'Places to Visit'. We started the topic looking at the seaside and discussing the different things we can find and do at the beach.

We enjoyed sharing our own experiences of going to the seaside and exploring the texture of the sand and the different shells. The shells were all different shapes and sizes and we used lots of different words to describe them, some were smooth, shiny, rough, swirly, long and bumpy. We have also enjoyed using our own experiences of the seaside in the small world area with the sea creatures and beach trays. We have been drawing and painting our own sea creatures with paint. We have also learnt about how to stay safe in the sun and about the different sea creatures we might find in the sea and the rock pools.



Science Week

We had a fantastic time during Science Week, we started the week with a really fun assembly by Mr North. He showed us how to blow up a balloon with a bottle and how to make a film canister go POP!

We took part in some experiments in Puffins and learnt that they don't always go how you want them too. We made a rainbow with some skittles and loved playing with the Ooblex. It was funny how it changed from a solid to a liquid and back again.

Miss Grant also tried to make a lava lamp but unfortunately it didn't work very well. It was a good job Miss Judd was on hand to make it work!



Caterpillars

Over the last few weeks, we have had some creepy crawlies come and join us in Puffins. We have been fascinated by watching them grow from tiny little black caterpillars into much bigger and fatter caterpillars. We are all very excited and eagerly waiting for them to turn into cocoons. While we wait, we have been designing our own butterflies using paint and cannot wait to see what they will look like when they emerge from their chrysalides.



We have also been looking at the Lifecycle of a Butterfly and sequencing the events in the correct order.



Please can we remind you to name all of your child's belongings, especially with the warmer weather hopefully arriving soon. This will help us to ensure that items go home with the correct child. Thank you.

Reception

Science week – We had a lovely walk to our newly renovated pond area where we saw lots of minibeasts and tadpoles. We came back to class and drew a picture of what we saw at the pond. The children did some fantastic writing using all their senses to describe our trip. We looked through books on different kinds of minibeasts and learnt about the lifecycle of a frog. The children got so excited searching for minibeasts in our Bug Hotel outside; they found caterpillars, ladybirds and a snail! We had a go at moulding different types of minibeasts using playdough.





We were lucky enough to receive 5 caterpillars to look after as we have been learning about The Lifecycle of a Butterfly. They have grown so much in one week and we cannot wait to see them spin their chrysalis very soon. Once they transform into butterflies we are very excited to release them at the pond. Our very own Mr North came and did a science show for us all filled with cool science experiments.



In our Maths lessons last week we learnt about 3D shape names and a few of their properties. We then built towers, castles, houses, shops and cities with them. This week we have been learning how to make ten numbers using tens frames, Numicon plates and Unifix cubes to show the tens and ones.



Growing – We have been planting sunflower seeds this week and learning about The Lifecycle of a Sunflower. The children loved planting the seeds and learning how to take care of a plant and all the parts of a plant. We can't wait to see how they grow over the coming weeks!



We are very excited to announce that we have booked our trip to Birdworld for next half term on Friday 21st June. A letter will be sent out closer to the time with all the details, so look out for it.

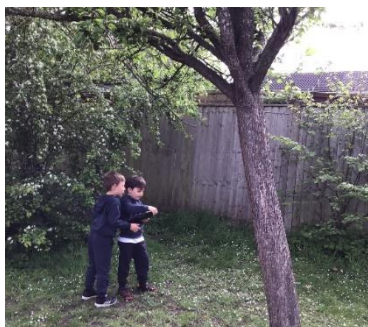

Year 1

PARK LIFE! The children have been very busy writing all about Percy the Park Keeper and learning about all the different types of parks.

In science, we have continued our observations of nature and the weather. Our school grounds have lots of buds and blossom and we have been using an app on the iPads to find out what plants and trees we have been looking at. We have been looking closely at what a plant is and learning the names of some common plants as well as identifying the basic parts. We have also been studying trees and their leaves to try and work out if it is evergreen or deciduous. It is definitely spring and summer isn't far away!



To highlight the importance of World Earth Day this year, the children made bug hotels from clay and have painted them in beautiful colours. We spent time discussing how we can look after our planet by making small everyday changes.



In our PSHE sessions, the children are learning how to keep themselves healthy including exercise, hygiene, teeth brushing, healthy eating and sun safety.

We are expecting *(or rather hoping for)* the weather to warm up so please make sure your child has a full water bottle in school every day, brings in a sun hat and comes to school wearing sun cream. Please can we also ask that cardigans and jumpers are labelled as they will be removing them more frequently. We have attached information on sun safety for your reference.



Year 2

Welcome back to the Summer term! We have really enjoyed kick starting our new topic for this half term which is, 'Around the world in 30 days'. The children have really enjoyed our first text for this unit of work, 'The Search for the Giant Arctic Jellyfish'. They have made some brilliant clay polar bears and vibrant jelly fish to adorn our classrooms as well as finding out all about the countries and animals of the Arctic circle, and writing some very interesting Arctic adventure diaries.



This week we will be heading off towards the equator to explore warmer territories. We were hoping the weather would follow suit but it's still pretty cold! Since our Tuesday PE sessions will now be outside, can you please make sure the children have a warm PE jacket until the weather warms up.

We have also started our planting unit by sowing some 'grass heads' (see below). These are just beginning to sprout their 'hair'. We have been recording their growth in our Grass Seed Diaries and are looking forward to seeing the 'hair' on our heads grow!



Our science week was a lot of fun and we are now watching in awe as the caterpillars in our classrooms begin to fatten up to create their cocoons. The children have been very entertained by how fat the caterpillars now are – so it was true ...they were VERY hungry.

This year we are hoping to develop our outdoor learning space (you may have spotted the free tyres kindly donated by Sandhurst Tyres). We are looking for various items to help us do this so if you have any of the following you no longer need, hiding away in a shed or garage, please donate them to this very good cause.

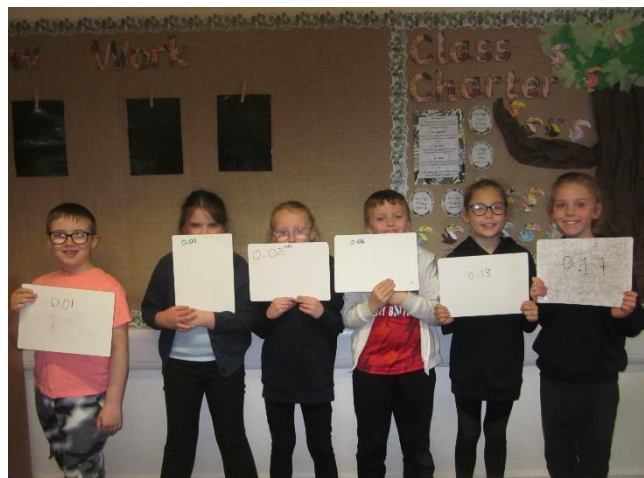
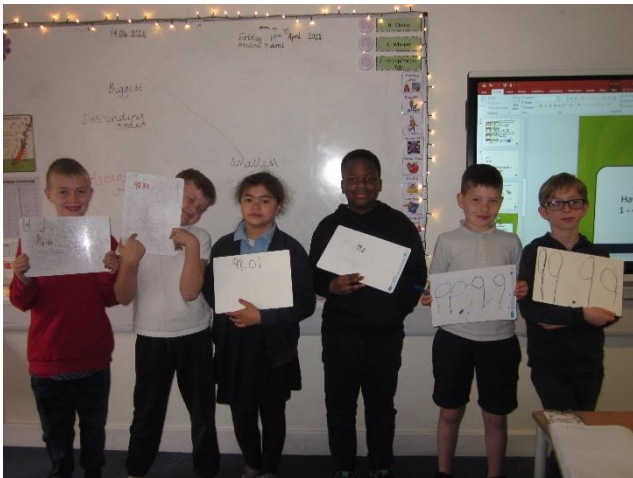
Reading Dens!

We were very impressed with the high standard of homework. The children enjoyed sharing their projects and demonstrating how they work.



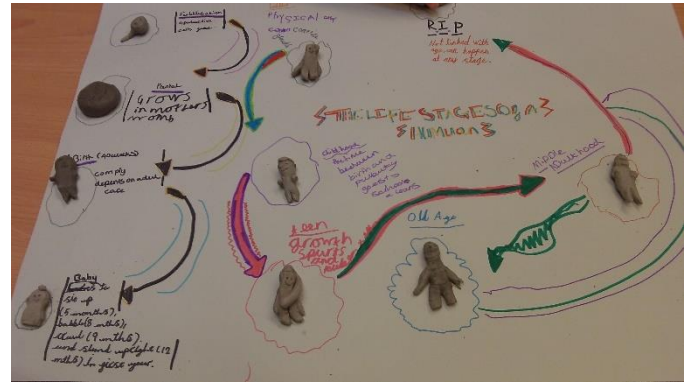
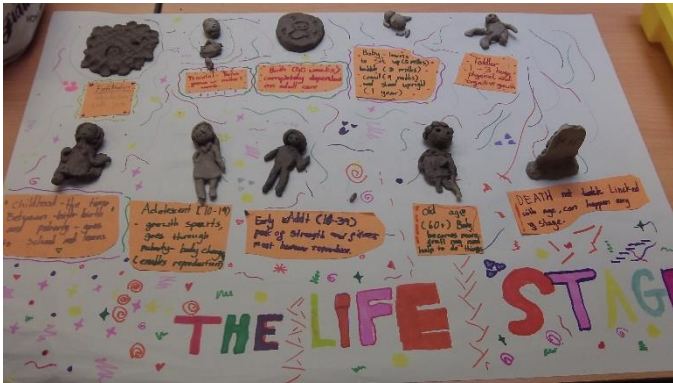
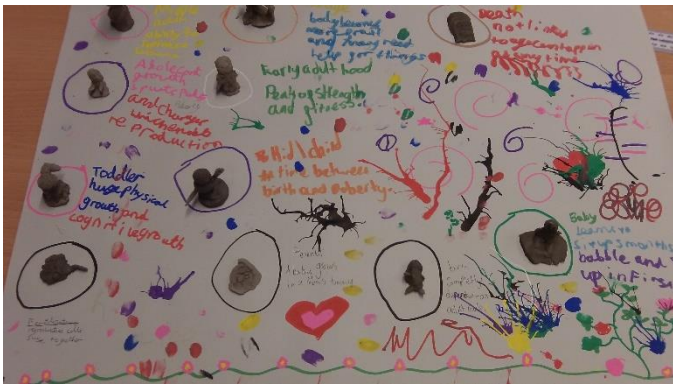
Off with her Head!

We've been back for less than 3 weeks and yet the Year 6 children have done so much.

In English the children wrote their autobiographies set in the year 2053 so that they would all be 40. It was great to read about the kind of things that they hope to achieve after they leave us here at Owlsmoor.

In history we have been getting to the end of the topic of World War One and have almost finished reading the brilliant *Private Peaceful* by Michael Morpurgo. Some of the work produced for this has been absolutely outstanding and we all look forward to moving on to the new topic of World War Two in the coming weeks. Our class text for this is *Goodnight Mr Tom* by Michelle Magorian – a truly fantastic book following the life of a poor East End child evacuated out to the countryside. A real chance for the children to see an aspect of the war from another child's point of view.

We have also started Rounders in our Monday PE sessions with some excellent talents on show. It's almost as if the Year 6 children are visualising something when they swing that bat so powerfully! This will culminate in the great "Battle of Year 6" where the two classes will play against each other in what some reporters are calling "the match of the century".

Obviously, we have been preparing for the upcoming SATs tests that run for 4 days from Monday 13th May. Our aim is for all the children to be able to try their best during that week and show the people who set them exactly what they can do. We are all aware that there is so much to every child than their SATs results and we have made sure that they have been told that and understand that. SATs don't measure so many of the amazing things that make the children who they are: sporting talents, artistic talents, singing, dancing, the way they get along with friends, help others, set the example to the rest of the school...the list goes on, so it is important to keep them in context for what they are – assessment tests to measure progress from Year 2 to Year 6.

As mentioned before, there will be a lot of relaxing and fun activities in between the SATs tests to ensure that there is a good balance to the children's schooling for that week. They will also be able to choose a biscuit or cake along with a piece of fruit before each test and this will be far more important than the tests themselves so they will be in a positive frame of mind before they start! If you are able to send in any of the above for that week it would be amazing.

The week of the residential trip to Bushcraft gets ever nearer. Mr Saunders and Mr Farrington paid a visit to the campsite last week to ensure that we all know our way around when we get there. It really is in a beautiful part of England and the set up looks perfect for a fantastic week under canvas. For those children not going, a great week of activities has been planned for them based from school too.

We have begun the transition process for secondary school as well. In the coming weeks, both Sandhurst and Edgbarrow will send staff to meet the children and talk with us about their capabilities and behaviour as well as activities that they like doing. This process will continue throughout the term to ensure that all the children are ready for Y7 by the time that they leave us.

We have been very busy in Kingfishers. We have enjoyed our new stories and the children have produced some fantastic writing!

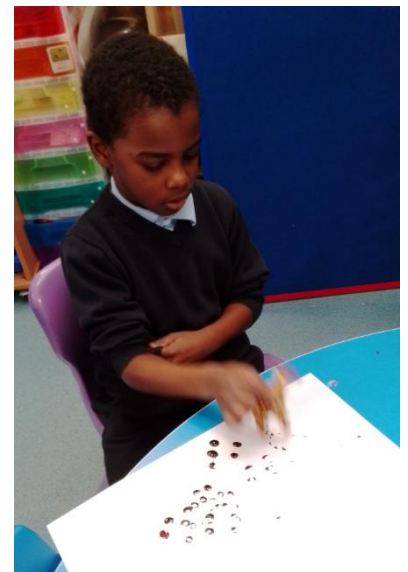
